Ideas for action



Personalise

🔇 Make sure that you've reflected the key points in the job application in your cover letter, CV, online forms.

Put yourself in the shoes of the person/company

🔇 What will impress them? Make sure you reflect this in your application.

What are the MOST important skills to showcase in your application?

📞 Use the top paragraph of your CV to showcase your super strengths.

Include a covering letter

🔇 If the process allows for one, it's worth doing. Keep it short, Why the role, why you, why now.

The brilliant basics

1. Always share your CV as a PDF file

This means you don't lose any formatting when sending.

2. Use no more than 2 pages

CVs are scanned for an average 6-8 seconds before people decide whether to dive deeper. Don't make the detail daunting!

3. See your CV as your 'best bits'

Your CV contains your highlights rather than a list of everything you've done (think achievements vs describing your role)

4. Add keywords

Pick out the top 3 soft/hard skills they are looking for in the job description and think how you can weave them in to your CV.

5. Reflect the role and company culture

Think about what you can do visually with your CV to align with the opportunity (e.g. using the company colour palette to stand out.)
